Jan van der Heyden (1637-1712)

Jan van der Heyden (1637-1712) was the preeminent Dutch painter of cityscapes and the first artist anywhere to record all the beauty of the urban scene. Approximately 40 paintings with supplemental drawings and prints by this great pioneer of cityscape painting are on view in the first monographic exhibition of Van der Heyden's art to be mounted in seventy years and the first show ever in this country. Following its debut at the Bruce Museum, selections from exhibition will travel to the renowned Rijksmuseum in Amsterdam, The Netherlands, where Van der Heyden's prints and drawings will be explored concurrently at the Rembrandthuis.
